















Standards

Standard 1: Mission

The land trust has a clear mission that serves a public interest, and all programs support that mission.

Standard 2: Compliance with Laws

The land trust fulfills its legal requirements as a nonprofit tax-exempt organization and complies with all laws.


Standard 3: Board Accountability

The land trust board acts ethically in conducting the affairs of the organization and carries out the board's legal and financial responsibilities as required by law.

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



Policy Builder My Dashboard

Instructions

From a Land Trust Accreditation Commission Guidance Document:

"The Commission reviews a variety of documents from applicants including the specific policies required by the accreditation indicator practices. Each required policy is reviewed for compliance with the indicator practice and to see that it is tailored to the applicant organization. The Commission also looks at evidence the applicant provides to show that the policies are being implemented."

As a prerequisite for registering for accreditation, your land trust will need to provide certain written, board-approved policies. The policy builder helps you to create those if you don't have them, as well as other polices that will be useful in demonstrating your organizations ability to implement other practices.

The policy builder units use the same "Putting it Into Practice" material found in the Standards and Practices Curriculum to walk you through the background of why a particular policy is needed; ask questions to elicit special circumstances of your lands trust that should be addressed, and allow your team to create a policy that you can approve and use.

Because the Land Trust Accreditation Commission is an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance, we cannot guarantee that the Commission will approve all policies created with our policy builder. Also, the Accreditation Commission requires evidence that your land trust implements your policies.

Required Policies:

- · 4A Conflict of Interest Policy
- . 9G Records Policy pursuant to practice 2D
- 11E Conservation Easement Enforcement Policy
- 11I Conservation Easement Amendment Policy

Note: This policy is not required of every applicant. It is only required when a land trust board does not approve each land or easement transaction, and has instead delegated this important responsibility to another party.

• 3F - Delegation of Transaction Approval Policy

The following policies are not required by the Commission, but may be helpful in developing and maintaining your records:

CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY TEMPLATE

Directions

- This template provides sample language that is appropriate for land trust conflict of interest policy. However, it is
 essential that you customize key parts of the template to make it useful for your land trust. If you simply cut and
 paste language without thinking through the impacts of the policy on your land trust's unique situation, may leave you
 vulnerable when most in need of protection.
- You need to first understand what makes a good policy. So, read <u>IRS Instructions for Form 1023 Appendix A:</u> <u>Sample Conflict of Interest Policy</u> and <u>sample conflict of interest policies</u>.
- 3. Read through the template below. The blank line will be automatically filled with your land trust's name.
 - Throughout the template, there are text boxes that contain questions, examples or sample language that cover key points that must be tailored to the unique situation of your land trust. Anything typed into the text boxes will automatically be placed in the generic easement template when downloaded. For example, if you don't delete the questions they will appear in the final policy. Remember, the more detailed, complete and accurate your answers are, the better your preliminary conflicts of interest policy draft will be.
- When completed, click on "Download My Policy" to save a copy, which you can then open in Microsoft Word or other word processing software.
- 5. Take your policy to your counsel for review before board adoption.
- 6. Implement your policy!

4A: Conflict of Interest Policy Template

Your conflict of interest policy should begin with a statement of purpose that discusses the goals of the policy and the principles it relies upon. The statement of purpose is particularly important because your land trust's policy on conflicts must be consistent with your organization's mission. All decisions made under this policy will follow from this crucial section. Add here any additional clauses specific to your land trust and its mission. This section should also include whether or not you will post the policy on your land trust's website or how members of the public can obtain copies of the policy.

Article I

PURPOSE

<u>Land Trust Alliance</u>'s effectiveness depends upon maintaining the highest levels of credibility, confidence and trust with the community it serves and all parties with whom it works. For this reason, it is crucial that <u>Land Trust Alliance</u> have responsible, well conceived conflict of interest policies and procedures to avoid real or perceived Conflicts of Interest.

All persons associated with <u>Land Trust Alliance</u> are reminded that the decisions and activities of the board of directors and staff, whether or not addressed in this policy, are governed by an overriding requirement of honesty, good faith and fiduciary responsibility for the organization and to the community it serves.

This policy is intended to supplement but not replace any applicable state or federal laws governing Conflicts of Interest applicable to charitable trusts.
